

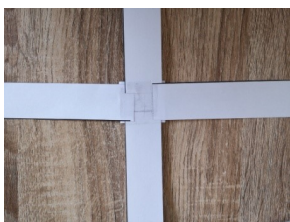
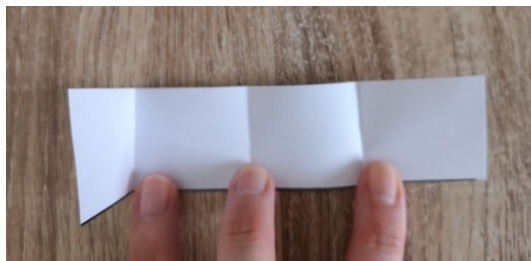
The Battle of Prestonpans 1745

The White Cockade

Use the sheet to cut 6 strips of paper (please be careful with scissors, and ask an adult if you need help).
First make a paper square: take one strip of paper and fold it in half.

Open the strip again and then fold each edge into the middle.

Then fold it in half using your original fold. Use glue or a piece of sellotape to stick it together.



Now take 4 strips of paper and using your sellotape or glue, stick one end of each onto a side of your square to create a cross shape.



Next, take the loose end of each strip of paper and curl the strip towards the middle of the square.

Stick the edges down into the centre with your sellotape or glue.



Take your last strip of paper and loop it around to make a ring.

Stick the edges down so it doesn't unroll!



Lastly, stick the ring to the centre of the square using your tape or glue.

You can now wear your cockade and show your support to the Jacobite campaign!

Battle Facts

The White Cockade was usually worn in the hat of a Jacobite supporter. Government soldiers usually wore black cockades in their hats. The cockade was particularly to Jacobites because most of them did not have a uniform, so it was often the only way of showing who they were fighting for.
